It's important to note that the ECFMG requires fulfillment of the above criteria within a specific timeframe, and a limited examination attempt is standard.

IMGs completing these benchmarks prove themselves educationally comparable to their US graduate counterparts. Unfortunately, there remains a reservation about our capabilities, abilities, and efficacy in our role as clinical medical practitioners and academics. Featuring the experiences of successful IMGs on this inclusive platform will invigorate other aspiring IMG physicians. It will also emphasize our strengths and ability to thrive as world-class physicians with significant achievements in various fields of medicine.
